Originally scheduled for June, it was a treat to hear his anecdotes after the three-month delay.


The combination of pot-luck and Paul Waite's hamburgers and hors d'oeuvres worked perfectly.

BACH THE ORGAN PROVER

A condensation of an article by William Sumner, The American Organist, November, 1985

"No one has ever tried out organs so severely and yet so honestly as he. No one understood registration as well as he. Organ builders were terrified when he sat down to play on their organs and drew the stops in his own manner, for they thought that the effect would not be as good as he was planning it; then they heard an effect that astounded them. The first thing he would do in trying an organ was this. He would say, in jest, 'Above all, I must know whether the organ has good lungs', and to find out, he would draw out every speaking stop and play in the fullest and richest possible texture. At this the organ builder would often grow quite pale with fright." (Written by C.P.E.Bach to Forkel).

Bach was in great demand in Germany as an "organ prover". The testing or proving of an organ was an important task, amounting almost to a ceremony and sometimes occupying nearly a week in Germany, the Netherlands and France until the 19th century. It was clear that he had the faculty of tonal analysis to a remarkable degree, thus, when it seemed a good idea he was able to abandon the traditional rules of organ registration.

"It often happened that friends invited him to show off the organ. He chose a suitable theme which would serve for improvisation in many organ forms and he would often play for two hours or more without interruption. First a prelude and fugue on the grand jeu, then to show of his skill in the art of registration he used a trio or quartet, always on the same theme. Then a choral and the melody used as counterpoint with imitations in three or four parts. Finally there would be a fugue on the plein jeu, so that every part of the organ had been revealed." (C.P.E.Bach)
