like we just filed all the choral music used over the Advent and Christmastide season. I don't know how efficient you are with this task, but I have to admit it isn't one of my strong points... Personally, I just spent two days last week filing dozens of anthems that were used over that season from the choir folders, and

ensuring that the choir had copies of upcoming music for the next several weeks.

The Executive Committee of RCCO Niagara has been working hard on a number of projects, as we plan for Spring through June, and looking ahead to events to offer the membership and community of Niagara in 2018-19. You are invited to attend and support our up-

coming events, beginning with:

March 2018

Pedals Pipes and Pizza on March 24th at 10:00 a.m. at Queen Street Baptist Church, and demonstrating their 3-manual Casavant. This is primarily an introduction to the (Pipe) Organ for children from 6 years old and up although adults are also welcome. We ask all members to spread the word to their students, and other colleagues that teach music either privately or in the school systems to promote this event, and encourage their students to PARTICIPATE, by attending, and even bringing a piece of music with them and get the chance to PLAY the organ, and walk into the organ chamber to look around, while being shown the different types of pipes and some of the capabilities of the organ, the King of Instruments. We will be serving Pizza to all in attendance, and the event is FREE, though we are always open to freewill donations to help defray the cost of the event. Please refer to our website rcconiagara.com for registration details, as though we won't turn someone away, it is good to have a rough idea of how many will be attending. The enthusiastic presenters for this event are James van den Brink and Ryan Baxter, both members of the centre. (It is our intention to make biographies of each available on the website).

Meet Eat and Sing on April 5th, 6:00 p.m. at St. Giles Presbyterian Church, St. Catharines. This is a new endeavour of the RCCO Niagara, as a sort of an adoption from the Royal School of Church Music, who aren't as active in Niagara as they once were... These events have always been a great success, and we encourage all of you to join us, and bring your choirs... In keeping with the traditions of the RSCM, we intentionally chose Thursday, April 5th for the event, as many church choirs rehearse on Thursday Evenings,

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The following is perhaps a little late but mildly entertaining nonetheless

2011 and all that

Seated one day at the 'puter, (I was weary and ill at ease) my fingers wandered idly over the silent keys ⁽¹⁾

and, almost by accident, I managed to confirm something that I had previously had a gut feeling about (as one does), namely that 2011 is a prime number.

Pursuing this line of thought (again idly), I decided that this could have absolutely nothing to do with the fact that the year 2011 seems to be very short on truly significant musical anniversaries. But, quite fortuitously, I was reminded by the *Sydney Morning Herald*'s Column 8 that 2011 is the 500th anniversary of the birth of the composer Osbert Parsley. You have never heard the name? Nor had I. But, as you will see from my introductory lines, I like to use my idle moments to unleash an enquiring mind, and I felt that the horticultural Mr Parsley might warrant some looking up (or digging up).

It turns out that Osbert Parsley, born in 1511, spent most of his life in Norwich (U.K) and died there in 1585. He was a "singing man" at the cathedral; in other words he was a member of the cathedral choir, for a period of fifty years: quite an achievement for anyone, especially in those days. He is first heard of in the choir in 1535 (at the age of 24), by which time the monks (the cathedral was then a Benedictine abbey) had deputed their service of song to paid men singers. He was obviously not a monk himself, as in 1558 he married a lady called Rose and bought a house in the parish of St Saviour's. One wonders whether the house had a nice garden: flowers at the front and herbs and vegetables at the back, as a fine example of nominative determinism.

Not a great deal else is known about his life (after all, not much happens in Norwich)^{(2),} but he did make some memorable contributions to the music of the Tudor period. His choral works include settings of verses from **Lamentations**, and a psalm, **Conserva me, Domine**. In most of his settings he preferred Latin texts, but he also composed English anthems and several settings of the Anglican prayer book service. Apparently when Queen Elizabeth I visited Norwich in 1578 (I believe they're still talking about it) the **Te Deum** that was sung was Parsley's composition.

Today his memory is somewhat overshadowed by more famous contemporaries like Thomas Tallis, John Taverner, William Byrd and Thomas Morley (another Norwich lad), but the esteem in which he was held, at least locally, is shown by a substantial plaque in the nave of Norwich Cathedral ^{(3).} Part of the attribution reads

Here lies the man whose Name in Spight of DeathRenowned lives by Blast of Golden Fame:Whose Harmony survives his vital BreathWho here a singing man did spend his DaysFull Fifty Years in our church melody.His Memory shines bright whom thus we praise.

(2) I once got a parking ticket outside the cathedral, but I didn't pay the fine, so that doesn't count.
